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Introduction

The National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) collects, analyzes, and disseminates data on the health status of U.S. residents. The results of surveys, analyses, and studies are made known through a number of data release mechanisms including publications, mainframe computer data files, CD-ROMs (Search and Retrieval Software, Statistical Export and Tabulation System (SETS)), and the Internet (http://www.cdc.gov/nchswww/nchshome.htm).

The National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES) is a periodic survey conducted by NCHS. The third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES III), conducted from 1988 through 1994, was the seventh in a series of these surveys based on a complex, multi-stage sample plan. It was designed to provide national estimates of the health and nutritional status of the United States' civilian, noninstitutionalized population aged two months and older.

This document includes the documentation for the NHANES III Adult Data File and also contains a general overview of the survey and the use of the data files. The general overview includes five sections. The first section, entitled "Guidelines for Data Users," contains important information about the use of the data files. The second section, "Survey Description," is a brief overview of the survey plan and operation. The third section, "Sample Design and Analysis Guidelines," describes some technical aspects of the sampling plan and discusses some analytic issues particularly related to the use of data from complex sample surveys. The "Data Preparation and Processing Procedures" section describes the editing conventions and the codes used to represent the data. The last and fifth section, "General References," includes a reference list for the survey overview sections of the document.

GUIDELINES FOR DATA USERS

Please refer to the following important information before analyzing data.

NHANES III Background Documents

- o The Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 1988-94, (NCHS, 1994; U.S. DHHS, 1996) provides an overview of the survey and includes copies of the survey forms.
- The sample design, nonresponse, and analytic guidelines documents on the NHANES III Reference Manuals and Reports CD-ROM (U.S. DHHS, 1996) discuss the reasons that sample weights and the complex survey design should be taken into account when conducting any analysis.
- Instruction manuals, laboratory procedures, and other NHANES III
 reference manuals on the NHANES III Reference Manuals and Reports
 CD-ROM(U.S. DHHS, 1996) are also available for further information on the details of the survey.

Analytic Data Set Preparation

- o Most NHANES III survey design and demographic variables are found only on the Adult and Youth Household Data Files. In preparing a data set for analysis, other data files must be merged with either or both of these files to obtain many important analytic variables.
- All of the NHANES III public use data files are linked with the common survey participant identification number (SEQN). Merging information from multiple NHANES III data files using this variable ensures that the appropriate information for each survey participant is linked correctly.
- o NHANES III public use data files do not have the same number of records on each file. The Household Questionnaire Files (divided into two files, Adult and Youth) contain more records than the Examination Data File because not everyone who was interviewed completed the examination. The Laboratory Data File contains data only for persons aged one year and older. The Individual Foods Data File based on the dietary recall has multiple records for each person rather than the one record per sample person contained in the other data files.
- o For each data file, SAS program code with standard variable names and labels is provided as separate text files on the CD-ROM that contains the data files. This SAS program code can be used to create a SAS data set from the data file.
- Modifications were made to items in the questionnaires, laboratory, and examination components over the course of the survey; as a result, data may not be available for certain variables for the full six years. In addition, variables may differ by phase since some changes were implemented between phases. Users are encouraged to read the Notes sections of this document carefully for information about changes.

 Extremely high and low values have been verified whenever possible, and numerous consistency checks have been performed. Nonetheless, users should examine the range and frequency of values before analyzing data.

- Some data were not ready for release at the time of this publication due to continued processing of the data or analysis of laboratory specimens. A listing of those data are available in the general information section of each data file.
- Confidential and administrative data are not being released to the public. Additionally, some variables have been recoded to help protect the confidentiality of the survey participants. For example, all age-related variables were recoded to 90+ years for persons who were 90 years of age and older.
- Some variable names may differ from those used in the Phase 1 NHANES
 III Provisional Data Release and some variables included in the Phase 1
 provisional release may not appear on these files.
- Although the data files have been edited carefully, errors may be detected. Please notify NCHS staff (301-436-8500) of any errors in the data file or the documentation.

Analytic Considerations

- NHANES III (1988-94) was designed so that the survey's first three years, 1988-91, its last three years, 1991-94, and the entire six years were national probability samples. Analysts are encouraged to use all six years of survey results.
- Sample weights are available for analyzing NHANES III data. One of the following three sample weights will be appropriate for nearly all analyses: interviewed sample final weight (WTPFQX6), examined sample final weight (WTPFEX6), and mobile examination center (MEC)- and home-examined sample final weight (WTPFHX6). Choosing which of these sample weights to use in any analysis depends on the variables being used. A good rule of thumb is to use "the least common denominator" approach. In this approach, the user checks the variables of interest. The variable that was collected on the smallest number of persons is the "least common denominator," and the sample weight that applies to that variable is the appropriate one to use for that analysis. For more detailed information, see the Analytic and Reporting Guidelines for NHANES III (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

SURVEY DESCRIPTION

The third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES III) was the seventh in a series of large health examination surveys conducted in the United States beginning in 1960. Three of these surveys, the National Health Examination Surveys (NHES), were conducted in the 1960's (NCHS, 1965; NCHS, 1967; NCHS, 1969). In 1970, an expanded nutrition component was added to provide data with which to assess nutritional status and dietary practices, and the name was changed to the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (Miller, 1973; Engel, 1978; McDowell, 1981). A special survey of Hispanic populations in the United States was conducted during 1982-1984 (NCHS, 1985).

The general structure of the NHANES III sample design was similar to that of the previous NHANES. All of the surveys used complex, multi-stage, stratified, clustered samples of civilian, noninstitutionalized populations. NHANES III was the first NHANES without an upper age limit; in fact, the age range for the survey was two months and older. A home examination option was employed for the first time in order to obtain examination data for very young children and for elderly persons who were unable to visit the mobile examination center (MEC). The home examination included only a subset of the components used in the full MEC examination since it would have been difficult to collect some types of data in a home setting. A detailed description of design specifications and copies of the data collection forms can be found in the Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 1988-1994 (NCHS, 1994; U.S. DHHS, 1996).

NHANES III was conducted from October 1988 through October 1994 in two phases, each of which comprised a national probability sample. The first phase was conducted from October 18, 1988, through October 24, 1991, at 44 locations. The second phase was conducted from September 20, 1991, through October 15, 1994, at 45 different locations. In NHANES III, 39,695 persons were selected over the six years; of those, 33,994 (86%) were interviewed in their homes. All interviewed persons were invited to the MEC for a medical examination. Seventy-eight percent (30,818) of the selected persons were examined in the MEC, and an additional 493 persons were given a special, limited examination in their homes.

Data collection began with a household interview. Several questionnaires were administered in the household: Household Screener Questionnaire, Family Questionnaire, Household Adult Questionnaire, and Household Youth Questionnaire.

At the MEC, an examination was performed, and five automated questionnaires or interviews were administered: MEC Adult Questionnaire, MEC Youth Questionnaire, MEC Proxy Questionnaire, 24-Hour Dietary Recall, and Dietary Food Frequency (ages 12-16 years). The health examination component included a variety of tests and procedures. The examinee's age at the time of the interview and other factors determined which procedures were administered. Blood and urine specimens were obtained, and a number of tests and measurements were performed including body measurements, spirometry, fundus photography, x-rays, electrocardiography, allergy and glucose tolerance tests, and ultrasonography. Measurements were taken of bone density, hearing, and physical, cognitive, and central nervous system functions. A physician performed a limited standardized medical examination and a dentist performed a standardized dental examination. While some of the blood and urine analyses were performed in the MEC laboratory, most analyses were conducted elsewhere by contract laboratories. A home examination was conducted for those sample persons aged 2-11 months and aged 20 years or older who were unable to visit the mobile examination center. The home examination consisted of an abbreviated version of the tests and interviews performed in the MEC. Depending on age of the sample person, the components included body measurements, blood pressure, spirometry, venipuncture, physical function evaluation, and a questionnaire to inquire about infant feeding, selected health conditions, cognitive function, tobacco use, and reproductive history.

SAMPLE DESIGN AND ANALYSIS GUIDELINES

Sample Design

The general structure of the NHANES III sample design is the same as that of the previous NHANES. Each of these surveys used a stratified, multi-stage probability design. The major design parameters of the two previous NHANES and the special Hispanic HANES, as well as NHANES III, have been previously summarized (Miller, 1973; McDowell, 1981; NCHS, 1985; NCHS, 1994). The NHANES III sample was designed to be self-weighting within a primary sampling unit (PSU) for subdomains (age, sex, and race-ethnic groups). While the sample was fairly close to self-weighting nationally for each of these subdomain groups, it was not representative of the total population, which includes institutionalized, non-civilian persons that were outside the scope of the survey.

The NHANES III sample represented the total civilian, noninstitutionalized population, two months of age or over, in the 50 states and the District of Columbia of the United States. The first stage of the design consisted of selecting a sample of 81 PSU's that were mostly individual counties. In a few cases, adjacent counties were combined to keep PSU's above a minimum population size. The PSU's were stratified and selected with probability proportional to size (PPS). Thirteen large counties (strata) were chosen with certainty (probability of one). For operational reasons, these 13 certainty PSU's were divided into 21 survey locations. After the 13 certainty strata were designated, the remaining PSU's in the United States were grouped into 34 strata, and two PSU's were selected per stratum (68 survey locations). The selection was done with PPS and without replacement. The NHANES III sample therefore consists of 81 PSU's or 89 locations.

The 89 locations were randomly divided into two groups, one for each phase. The first group consisted of 44 and the other of 45 locations. One set of PSU's was allocated to the first three-year survey period (1988-91) and the other set to the second three-year period (1991-94). Therefore, unbiased estimates (from the point of view of sample selection) of health and nutrition characteristics can be independently produced for both Phase 1 and Phase 2 as well as for both phases combined.

For most of the sample, the second stage of the design consisted of area segments composed of city or suburban blocks, combinations of blocks, or other area segments in places where block statistics were not produced in the 1980 Census. In the first phase of NHANES III, the area segments were used only for a sample of persons who lived in housing units built before 1980. For units built in 1980 and later, the second stage consisted of sets of addresses selected from building permits issued in 1980 or later. These are referred to as "new construction segments." In the second phase, 1990 Census data and maps were used to define the area segments. Because the second phase followed within a few years of the 1990 Census, new construction did not account for a significant part of the sample, and the entire sample came from the area segments. The third stage of sample selection consisted of households and certain types of group quarters, such as dormitories. All households and eligible group quarters in the sample segments were listed, and a subsample was designated for screening to identify potential sample persons. The subsampling rates enabled production of a national, approximately equal-probability sample of households in most of the United States with higher rates for the geographic strata with high Mexican-American populations. Within each geographic stratum, there was a nearly equal-probability sample of households across all 89 stands.

Persons within the sample of households or group quarters were the fourth stage of sample selection. All eligible members within a household were listed, and a subsample of individuals was selected based on sex, age, and race or ethnicity. The definitions of the sex, age, race or ethnic classes, subsampling rates, and designation of potential sample persons within screened households were developed to provide approximately self-weighting samples for each subdomain within geographic strata and at the same time to maximize the average number of sample persons per sample household. Previous NHANES indicated that this increased the overall participation rate. Although the exact sample sizes were not known until data collection was completed, estimates were made. Below is a summary of the sample sizes for the full six-year NHANES III at each stage of selection:

More detailed information on the sample design and weighting and estimation procedures for NHANES III can be found in the Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 1988-94 (NCHS, 1994; U.S. DHHS, 1996) and in the Analytic and Reporting Guidelines: Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES III), 1988-94 (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

Analysis Guidelines

Because of the complex survey design used in NHANES III, traditional methods of statistical analysis based on the assumption of a simple random sample are not applicable. Detailed descriptions of this issue and possible analytic methods for analyzing NHANES data have been described earlier (NCHS, 1985; Yetley, 1987; Landis, 1982; Delgado, 1990). Recent analytic and reporting guidelines that should be used for most NHANES III analyses and publications are contained in Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996). These recommendations differ slightly from those used by analysts for previous NHANES surveys. These suggested guidelines provide a framework to users for producing estimates that conform to the analytic design of the survey. All users are strongly urged to review these analytic and reporting guidelines before beginning any analyses of NHANES III data. It is important to remember that this set of statistical guidelines is not absolute. When conducting analyses, the analyst needs to use his/her subject matter knowledge (including methodological issues) as well as information about the survey design. The more one deviates from the original analytic categories defined in the sample design, the more important it is to evaluate the results carefully and to interpret the findings cautiously.

In NHANES III, 89 survey locations were randomly divided into two sets or phases, the first consisting of 44 and the other of 45 locations. One set of PSU's was allocated to the first three-year survey period (1988-91) and the other set to the second three-year period (1991-94). Therefore, unbiased national estimates of health and nutrition characteristics can be independently produced for each phase as well as for both phases combined. Computation of national estimates from both phases combined (i.e., total NHANES III) is the preferred option; individual phase estimates may be highly variable. In addition, individual phase estimates are not statistically independent. It is also difficult to evaluate whether differences in individual phase estimates are real or due to methodological differences. That is, differences may be due to changes in sampling methods or data collection methodology over time. At this time, there is no valid statistical test for examining differences between Phase 1 and Phase 2. Therefore, although point estimates can be produced separately for each phase, no test is available to test whether those estimates are significantly different from each other.

NHANES III is based on a complex, multi-stage probability sample design. Several aspects of the NHANES design must be taken into account in data analysis, including the sample weights and the complex survey design. Appropriate sample weights are needed to estimate prevalence, means, medians, and other statistics. Sample weights are used to produce correct population estimates because each sample person does not have the same probability of selection. The sample weights incorporate the differential probabilities of selection and include adjustments for noncoverage and nonresponse. A detailed discussion of nonresponse adjustments and issues related to survey coverage have been published (U.S. DHHS, 1996). With the large over sampling of young children, older persons, black persons, and Mexican-Americans in NHANES III, it is essential that the sample weights be used in all analyses. Otherwise, a misinterpretation of results is highly likely. Other aspects of the design that must be taken into account in data analyses are the strata and PSU pairings from the sample design. These pairings should be used to estimate variances and test for statistical significance. For weighted analyses, analysts can use special computer software packages that use an appropriate method for estimating variances for complex samples such as SUDAAN (Shah, 1995) and WesVarPC (Westat, 1996).

Although initial exploratory analyses may be performed on unweighted data using standard statistical packages and assuming simple random sampling, final analyses should be done on weighted data using appropriate sample weights. A summary of the weighting methodology and the type of sample weights developed for NHANES III is included in Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

The purpose of weighting the sample data is to permit analysts to produce estimates of statistics that would have been obtained if the entire sampling frame (the United States) had been surveyed. Sample weights can be considered as measures of the number of persons the particular sample observation represents. Weighting takes into account several features of the survey: the specific probabilities of selection for the individual domains that were over sampled as well as nonresponse and differences between the sample and the total U.S. population. Differences between the sample and the population may arise due to sampling variability, differential under coverage in the survey among demographic groups, and possibly other types of response errors, such as differential response rates or misclassification errors. Sample weighting in NHANES III was used to:

- Compensate for differential probabilities of selection among subgroups (i.e., age-sex-race-ethnicity subdomains where persons living in different geographic strata were sampled at different rates);
- Reduce biases arising from the fact that nonrespondents may be different from those who participate;
- 3. Bring sample data up to the dimensions of the target population totals;
- 4. Compensate, to the extent possible, for inadequacies in the sampling frame (resulting from omissions of some housing units in the listing of area segments, omissions of persons with no fixed address, etc.); and
- 5. To reduce variances in the estimation procedure by using auxiliary information that is known with a high degree of accuracy.

In NHANES III, the sample weighting was carried out in three stages. The first stage involved the computation of weights to compensate for unequal probabilities of selection (objective 1, above). The second stage adjusted for nonresponse (objective 2). The third stage used poststratification of the sample weights to Census Bureau estimates of the U.S. population to accomplish the third, fourth, and fifth objectives simultaneously. In NHANES III, several types of sample weights (see the sample weights table that follows) were computed for the interviewed and examined sample and are included in the NHANES III data file. Also, sample weights were computed separately for Phase 1 (1988-91), Phase 2 (1991-94), and total NHANES III (1988-94) to facilitate analysis of items collected only in Phase 1, only in Phase 2, and over six years of the survey. Three sets of pseudo strata and PSU pairings are provided to use with SUDAAN in variance estimation. Since NHANES III is based on a complex, multi-stage sample design, appropriate sample weights should be used in analyses to produce national estimates of prevalence and associated variances while accounting for unequal probability of selection of sample persons. For example, the final interview weight, WTPFQX6, should be used for analysis of the items or questions from the family or household questionnaires, and the final MEC examination weight, WTPFEX6, should be used for analysis of the questionnaires and measurements administered in the MEC. Furthermore, for a combined analysis of measurements from the MEC examinations and associated medical history questions from the household interview, the final MEC examination weight, WTPFEX6, should be used. We recommend using SUDAAN (Shah, 1995) to estimate statistics of interest and the associated variance. However, one can also use other published methods for variance estimation. Application of SUDAAN and alternative methods, such as the average design effect approach, balance repeated replication (BRR) methods, or jackknife methods for variance estimation, are discussed in Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

Appropriate Uses of the NHANES III Sample Weights

Final interview weight, WTPFQX6

Use only in conjunction with the sample interviewed at home and with items collected during the household interview.

Final examination (MEC only) weight, WTPFEX6

Use only in conjunction with the MEC-examined sample and with interview and examination items collected at the MEC.

Final MEC+home examination weight, WTPFHX6

Use only in conjunction with the MEC+home-examined sample and with items collected at both the MEC and home.

Final allergy weight, WTPFALG6

Use only in conjunction with the allergy subsample and with items collected as part of the allergy component of the exam.

Final CNS weight, WTPFCNS6

Use only in conjunction with the CNS subsample and with items collected as part of the CNS component of the exam.

Final morning examination (MEC only) subsample weight, WTPFSD6

Use only in conjunction with the MEC-examined persons assigned to the morning subsample and only with items collected in the MEC exam.

Final afternoon/evening examination (MEC only) subsample weight, WTPFMD6

Use only in conjunction with the MEC-examined persons assigned to the afternoon/evening subsample and only with items collected in the MEC exam.

Final morning examination (MEC+home) subsample weight, WTPFHSD6

Use only in conjunction with the MEC- and home-examined persons assigned to the morning subsample and with items collected during the MEC and home examinations.

Final afternoon/evening examination (MEC+home) weight, WTPFHMD6

Use only in conjunction with the MEC- and home-examined persons assigned to the afternoon/evening subsample and with items collected during the MEC and home examinations.

DATA PREPARATION AND PROCESSING PROCEDURES

Automated data collection procedures for the survey were introduced in NHANES III. In the mobile examination centers, data for the interview and examination components were recorded directly onto a computerized data collection form. With the exception of a few independently automated systems, the system was centrally integrated. This operation allowed for ongoing monitoring of much of the data. Before the introduction of the computer-assisted personal interview (CAPI), the household questionnaire data were reviewed manually by field editors and interviewers. CAPI (1992-1994 only) questionnaires featured built-in edits to prevent entering inconsistencies and out-of-range responses. The multi-level data collection and quality control systems are discussed in detail in the Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 1988-1994 (NCHS, 1994; U.S. DHHS, 1996). All interview, laboratory, and examination data were sent to NCHS for final processing.

Guidelines were developed that provided standards for naming variables, filling missing values and coding conventional responses, handling missing records, and standardizing two-part quantity/unit questionnaire variables. NCHS staff, assisted by contract staff, developed data editing specifications that checked data sets for valid codes, ranges, and skip pattern consistencies and examined the consistency of values between interrelated variables. Comments, collected in both interviews and examination components, were reviewed and recoded when possible. Responses to "Other" and "Specify" were recoded either to existing code categories or to new categories. The documentation for each data set includes notes for those variables that have been recoded and standardized and for those variables that differ significantly from what appears in the original data collection instrument. While the data have undergone many quality control and editing procedures, there still may be values that appear extreme or illogical. Values that varied considerably from what was expected were examined by analysts who checked for comments or other responses that might help to clarify unusual values. Generally, values were retained unless they could not possibly be true, in which case they were changed to "Blank but applicable." Therefore, the user must review each data set for extreme or inconsistent values and determine the status of each value for analysis.

Several editing conventions were used in the creation of final analytic data sets:

- Standardized variables were created to replace all two-part quantity/unit questions using standard conversion factors. Standardized variables have the same name as the variable of the two-part question with an "S" suffix. For instance, MAPF18S (Months received WIC benefits) in the MEC Adult Questionnaire was created from the two-part response option to question F18, "How long did you receive benefits from the WIC program?," using the conversion factor 12 months per year.
- 2. Recoded variables were created by combining responses from two or more like variables, or by collapsing responses to create a summary variable for the purpose of confidentiality. Recoded variables have the original variable name with an R suffix. For example, place of birth variable (HFA6X) in the Family Questionnaire was collapsed to a three

level response category (U.S., Mexico, Other) and renamed HFA6XCR. Generally, only the recoded variable has been included in the data file. 3. Fill values, a series of one or more digits, were used to represent certain specific conditions or responses. Below is a list of the fill values that were employed. Some of the fill values pertain only to questionnaire data, although 8-fill and blank-fill values are found in all data sets. Other fill values, not included in this list, are used to represent component-specific conditions.

6-fills = Varies/varied. (Questionnaires only)

7-fills = Fewer than the smallest number that could be reported within the question structure (e.g., fewer than one cigarette per day). (Questionnaires only)

8-fills = Blank but applicable/cannot be determined. This means that a respondent was eligible to receive the question, test, or component but did not because of refusal, lack of time, lack of staff, loss of data, broken vial, language barrier, unreliability, or other similar reasons.

9-fills = Don't know. This fill was used only when a respondent did not know the response to a question and said, "I don't know." (Questionnaires only)

Blank fills = Inapplicable. If a respondent was not eligible for a questionnaire, test, or component because of age, gender, or specific reason, the variable was blank-filled. In the questionnaire, if a respondent was not asked a question because of a skip-pattern, variables corresponding to the question were blank-filled. For examination or laboratory components, if a person was excluded by a defined protocol (e.g., screening exclusion questions) and these criteria are included in the data set, then the corresponding variables were blank-filled for that person. For home examinees, variables for examination components and blood tests not performed as part of the home examination protocol were blank-filled.

- 4. For variables describing discrete data, codes of zero (0) were used to mean "none," "never," or the equivalent. Value labels for which "0" is used include: "has not had," "never regularly," "still taking," or "never stopped using." Unless otherwise labeled, for variables containing continuous data, "zero" means "zero.
- 5. Where there are logical skip patterns in the flow of the questionnaire or examination component, the skip was indicated by placing the variable label of the skip destination in parentheses as part of the value label of the response generating the skip. For example, in the Physical Function Evaluation, the variable PFPWC (in wheelchair) has a value label, "2 No (PFPSCOOT)" that means that the next item for persons not in a wheelchair would be represented by the variable, PFPSCOOT.

Variable Nomenclature

A unique name was assigned to every NHANES III variable using a standard convention. By following this naming convention, the origin of each variable is clear, and there is no chance of overlaying similar variables across multiple components. Variables range in length from three to eight characters. The first two variable characters represent the topic (e.g., analyte, questionnaire instrument, examination component) and are listed below alphabetically by topic. For questionnaires administered in the household, the remainder of the variable name following the first two characters indicates the question section and number. For example, data for the response to the Household Adult Questionnaire question B1 are contained in the variable HAB1. For most laboratory and examination variables, as well as some other variables, a "P" in the third position refers to "primary" and the remainder of the variable name is a brief description of the item. For instance, in the Laboratory Data File, information on the length of time the person fasted before the first blood draw is contained in the variable PHPFAST. The variable PHPFAST was derived as follows: characters 1-2 (PH) refer to "phlebotomy," character 3 (P) refers to "primary," characters 4-8 (FAST) refer to an abbreviation for "fasting."

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GENERAL INFORMATION

The NHANES III Household Adult Questionnaire Data File contains all data collected during the household interviews for adults 17 years and older. Demographic data, survey design variables, and sampling weights for this age group are also included. This first section provides a brief background and information about the contents of the Household Adult Questionnaire Data File. The second section is the Data File Index; a listing of all of the variables with the standard names and their positions in the data set. The third section contains the frequency counts and codes for all of the variables, followed by notes and appendices. References are found in the fourth section.

The data that comprise this file were obtained from three separate interviews administered in the household: the Screener, the Family, and Household Adult questionnaires. The Screener was a brief interview administered to all households within selected sampling units to determine eligibility for participation in the survey. Information obtained from the Screener questionnaire was the basis for the demographic variables, and survey-related variables. The purpose of the Family questionnaire was to obtain data on educational levels, occupation, health insurance coverage, income, and food security of family members, and to record characteristics of the house itself.

The Household Adult questionnaire was administered to the respondent, or in some instances to a proxy respondent. Questions on topics such conditions, health services usage, dental care, tobacco use and vitamin, mineral and medicine use were asked according to age subgroups. At the end of the interview, the respondents's blood pressure was measured three times. A second set of blood pressure measurements was obtained during the 4-hour physical examination at the mobile examination center (See NHANES III Examination Data File). The interview was completed by 20050 adults aged 17 years and older during the six years of NHANES III.

Interviews were conducted by field staff, in both English and Spanish. All staff received intensive initial training, and formal retraining was conducted throughout the survey to ensure that high skill levels were maintained. The data collection system was automated in Phase 2, at which time interviews were conducted using CAPI (computer-assisted personal interview). Details on survey instruments and forms, training manuals and data collection procedures are published elsewhere (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

Data processing and editing were performed for consistency of responses within sections of the questionnaire sections. Identifiable information including names, addresses, and social security numbers, as well as other administrative items were excluded from the data file in order to ensure confidentiality.

Notes are provided both for standardized and recoded variables, and for variables requiring additional explanation. Hand cards and other diagrams that were used during interviews are located with copies of the survey instruments in the Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (U.S. DHHS, 1996). Users should note that because questions were modified, reordered, added, or deleted, this documentation may not follow the exact ordering of the questions on survey instruments. Since NHANES III was based on a complex multistage design, appropriate sample weights should be used in analyses to produce national estimates and associated variances. The final interview weights WTPFQX6 should be used for analysis of interview data alone. Some sections of the Household Adult questionnaire were identical to sections of the Household Youth questionnaire (e.g., vitamin, mineral and medicine use) enabling the data to be analyzed together. If interview data are combined with examination, laboratory or dietary data, the total MEC weights (WTPFEX6) or MEC+home weights (WTPFHX6) should be used.

Demographic Notes

DMPFSEQ: Family sequence number

This variable can be used to determine all family members who participated in the survey. Sample persons who have identical family sequence numbers (i.e. match on all 5 digits) are members of the same family.

DMPSTAT: Examination/interview status

This variable identifies the interview or examination status of all persons selected for the NHANES III sample. Interviewed persons completed preselected questions in specific sections of the Household Adult or Youth Questionnaires. Mobile examination center (MEC)-examined persons were interviewed and successfully completed at least one examination component in the MEC. Home-examined persons were interviewed and successfully completed at least one home examination component. The home examination was an option for frail older adults, infants 2-11 months of age, and other adults who were unable to come to the MEC.

DMARETHN: Race-ethnicity

This key analytic variable, based on the NHANES III survey design, was derived from many sources of data and is based on reported race and ethnicity. The other category includes all Hispanics, regardless of race, who were not Mexican-American and also includes all non-Hispanics from racial groups other than white or black.

DMARACER: Race

This variable was obtained from two primary sources: the Screener and the Family Questionnaires. Prior to the selection of the sample, race (Black, White, Other) was self-reported or reported by proxy in the Screener Questionnaire. During the administration of the Family Questionnaire, race was self-reported or reported by the respondent of the Family Questionnaire from five categories (Aleut, Eskimo, American Indian, Asian or Pacific Islander, Black, White, Other). Responses from the two sources were adjudicated, as necessary, to create a three level variable (Black, White, Other).

DMAETHNR: Ethnicity

This variable was obtained from two primary sources: the Screener and the Family Questionnaires. As part of both interviews, hand cards were used to determine Mexican/Mexican-American or Other Latin American/Spanish ancestry or national origin. Responses of non-Hispanic ancestry or national origin were categorized as other. Responses from the two interviews were adjudicated, as necessary, and this three level variable was created.

HSAGEIR: Age (Screener Questionnaire)

Age was calculated using the birth date which was obtained from the Screener Questionnaire. The variable HSAGEU provides the age unit (months or years) for HSAGEIR. Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HSAITMOR: Age in months (Screener Questionnaire)

Age in months was calculated by computing number of months between the Screener Questionnaire date and date of birth. This variable was created for analyses where exact age at the interview may be needed. HSAITMOR differs slightly from the age in years (HSAGEIR), the variable most often used for analyses. Ages of 1080 months and older (90 years and older) were recoded into a single category of 1080+ months to protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HSFSIZER: Family Size

Family size represents the total number of related persons living in a household (single dwelling unit). All household members were rostered by family during the Screener interview. Household members who were related to the family reference person (knowledgeable household member 17 years or older who owned or rented the dwelling unit) by blood or marriage were considered part of the family. Adopted children, fosterand god-children were also included, if they were living in the dwelling unit. However, family members who were away at college, or living independently were not included. Other household members who were unrelated to the reference person were considered members of separate families. Families with 10 members or more were recoded into a single response category of 10+ persons to help protect confidentiality. See note for Household Size (HSHSIZER).

HSHSIZER: Household Size

Household size represents the total number of persons living in a single dwelling unit, both related and unrelated. All permanent household members were rostered according to their family as part the Screener interview. This was done in order to obtain a complete list of all persons living or staying in the dwelling unit, and to distinguish household and family members. Households with 10 members or more were recoded into a single response category of 10+ persons to help protect confidentiality. See note for Family Size (HFHSIZER).

DMPCNTYR: County FIPS codes for United States counties with populations of 500,000 and more

These county FIPS codes identify large counties with populations of 500,000 and more that were sampled in the survey. Counties with population less than 500,000 are not included to prevent identification of these locations. See Appendix 1 for listing of codes.

DMPFIPSR: State FIPS codes for United States counties with populations of 500,000 and more

These state FIPS codes identify counties with populations of 500,000+ that were sampled in the survey. Counties with population less than 500,000 are not included to prevent identification of these locations. See Appendix 1 for listing of codes.

DMPMETRO: Urbanization classification based on USDA Rural-Urban continuum codes

These classifications are based on the USDA Rural-Urban codes (Butler and Beale, 1993) that describe metro and nonmetro counties by degree of urbanization and nearness to metro areas. The USDA codes were recoded into two categories to prevent identification of counties that were sampled in the survey.

DMPCREGN: Census region

The United States was divided into four broad geographic regions as defined by the Bureau of Census. Because all states were not included in the selected sample, regional estimates may not be representative for a given region.

DMPPIR: Poverty income ratio (or poverty index)

The poverty income ratio (PIR) was computed as a ratio of two components. The numerator was the midpoint of the observed family income category in the Family Questionnaire variable:HFF19R. The denominator was the poverty threshold, the age of the family reference person, and the calender year in which the family was interviewed.

Poverty threshold values (in dollars) are produced annually by the Census Bureau (Series P-60). These threshold values are based on calendar years and adjusted for changes caused by inflation between calendar years. Reports for each of the calendar years in the survey (1988-94) were used in the calculation of PIR. For the years 1991 and 1994, data from preliminary reports were used. The poverty income ratio allows income data to be analyzed in a comparable manner across the six years of the survey and with previous NHANES.

Persons who reported having had no income and were assigned a zero value for PIR. A substantial proportion of persons refused to report their income or income category during the Family Questionnaire. Due to the income nonresponse the potential for bias in PIR may be high. Users are cautioned to examine potential nonresponse bias for PIR and other income variables. Survey Design Data

SDPPHASE: Phase of NHANES III survey

For operational purposes, 81 primary sampling units were divided into 89 survey locations (or stands) and randomly allocated to two three-year phases. Phase 1 data were collected from October 1988 through October 1991 and Phase 2 data were collected from October 1991 through October 1994.

SDPSTRA6, SDPSTRA1, SDPSTRA2, and SDPPSU6, SDPPSU1, SDPPSU2: Pseudo strata codes and pseudo PSU pair codes

Because NHANES III was based upon a complex sample design, the assumptions of many statistical tests and routinely available statistical programs are not met. For this reason, when estimates of the variances of statistics are computed, the technique of estimation must be based upon complex sampling theory. In order to provide users with the capability of estimating the complex sample variances, 49 pseudo strata and a pair of Primary Sampling Unit (PSU) codes per stratum were designed.

A software package, "SUDAAN- Software for the Statistical Analysis of Correlated Data" (Shah, 1995), was developed by the Research Triangle Institute to analyze complex sample design data like NHANES. SUDAAN uses strata and PSU codes to conduct analysis with two PSU per stratum design. Therefore, definition of pseudo strata and PSU provided in this data file should be used to compute complex sample variances in analyses. Other software available for estimation of complex sample variance may also be used. For further discussion of methods of variance estimation in NHANES III, see additional information on this subject in Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996). Sampling Weights

WTPFQX6, WTPFQX1, WTPFQX2: Total NHANES III and phase-specific final interview weights

These sampling weights should be used only for items collected during the household interviews. To compute final interview weights, final basic weights were first adjusted for nonresponse to household interview, then post-stratified to the unpublished Current Population Survey 1990 (Phase 1) and 1993 (Phase 2) population control estimates of the U.S. population adjusted for undercount. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

WTPFEX6, WTPFEX1, WTPFEX2: Total NHANES III and phase-specific final MEC examination weights

These MEC sampling weights should be used for analysis of measurements or interview items collected in the MEC. Persons who were not examined in the MEC have a sampling weight of zero and should be excluded from analyses. To compute final MEC examination weights, final interview weights were first adjusted for nonresponse to MEC examinations, then post-stratified to the unpublished Current Population Survey 1990 (Phase 1) and 1993 (Phase 2) population control estimates of the U.S. population adjusted for undercount. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology(U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

WTPFHX6, WTPFHX1, WTPFHX2: Total NHANES III and phase-specific MEC+home examination weights

These MEC+home sampling weights should be used for analysis of the examination items where measurements or interview items were collected in the MEC and home. Persons who were not examined in the MEC or home have a sampling weight of zero and should be excluded from analyses. To compute final MEC+home examination weights, final interview weights were first adjusted for nonresponse to MEC and home examinations, then post-stratified to unpublished Current Population Survey 1990 (Phase 1) and 1993 (Phase 2) population control estimates of the U.S. population adjusted for undercount. No separate sampling weights were computed for home examinees. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996). WTPFALG6, WTPFALG1, WTPFALG2: Total NHANES III and phase-specific allergy examination subsample weights

These subsample weights are for analysis of allergy measurements. Allergy skin reactivity tests were administered to all MEC-examined persons aged 6-19 years and a random half-sample of the adults aged 20-59 years. Eligible MEC-examined persons who did not complete the allergy tests have a sampling weight of zero and should be excluded from the analyses. Final MEC examination weights were first adjusted for selection of the half-sample among adults (20-59 years), and post-stratified to the unpublished Current Population Survey 1990 (Phase 1) and 1993 (Phase 2) population control estimates of the U.S. population adjusted for undercount in the final step. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

WTPFCNS6, WTPFCNS1, WTPFCNS2: Total NHANES III and phase-specific central nervous system (CNS) examination subsample final weights

These subsample weights are for analysis of measurements from the Central Nervous System (CNS) test. The CNS examination was administered to a random half-sample of the adults aged 20-69 years. Eligible MEC-examined persons who did not complete CNS testing have a sampling weight of zero and should be excluded from the analyses. Final MEC examination weights were first adjusted for selection of half sample among adults (20-59 years), and post-stratified to unpublished Current Population Survey 1990 (Phase 1) and 1993 (Phase 2) population control estimates of the U.S. population adjusted for undercount in the final step. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

WTPFSD6, WTPFSD1, WTPFSD2: Total NHANES III and phase-specific morning session MEC examination subsample final weights

These subsample weights are for special analyses where fasting time may be an important factor. They were computed for persons aged 12 years and older who were scheduled and examined in the MEC morning session. Sampled households in the survey were randomly assigned to one of two groups -- morning session ("standard") or afternoon/evening session ("modified") assignments. All sample persons from a household received the same session assignment and were requested to schedule examinations for the assigned session. Fasting instructions varied by age and session assignment (Plan and Operation of The Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 1988-94, U.S. DHHS, 1996). It should be noted that actual fasting time may have differed from the instructed fasting time and can be obtained from the variable PHPFAST in the NHANES III Laboratory Data File. To compute these weights, final MEC examination weights were first adjusted for the random half selection, then adjusted for the non-response to assigned session, and finally, post-stratified to the unpublished Current Population Survey 1990 and 1993 Population control estimates of the U.S. population adjusted for undercount. Eligible MEC-examined persons who were assigned to the morning

session and examined in another session have a sampling weight of zero and should be excluded in analyses. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996). WTPFMD6, WTPFMD1, WTPFMD2: Total NHANES III and phase-specific afternoon/evening session MEC examination subsample final weights

These subsample weights are for special analyses where fasting time might be an important factor. They were computed for MEC examined persons aged 12 years and older who were scheduled and examined in the afternoon or evening sessions. Sampled households in the survey were randomly assigned to one of two groups -- morning session ("standard") or afternoon/evening session ("modified") assignments. All sample persons from a household received the same session assignment and were requested to schedule examinations for the assigned session. Fasting instruction varied by age and session assignments (Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 1988-94, U.S. DHHS, 1996). Sampled households in the survey were randomly assigned to one of two groups -- morning session ("standard") or afternoon/evening session ("modified") assignments. All sample persons from a household received the same session assignment and were requested to schedule examinations for the assigned session. Fasting instruction varied by age and session assignments (Plan and Operations of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, 1988-94, U.S. DHHS, 1996). It should be noted that actual fasting time may have differed from the instructed fasting time and can be obtained from the variable PHPFAST in the NHANES III Laboratory Data File. These subsample weights are for special analyses where fasting time may be an important factor. They were computed for MEC+home examined persons aged 12 years and older who were scheduled and examined in the afternoon or evening sessions. Sampled households in the survey were randomly assigned to one of two groups -- morning session ("standard") or afternoon/evening session ("modified") assignments. All sample persons from a household received the same session assignment and were requested to schedule examinations for the assigned session. Fasting instruction varied by age and session assignments (Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, U.S. DHHS, 1996). It should be noted that actual fasting time may have differed from the instructed fasting time. The actual fasting time can be obtained from the variable PHPFAST in the NHANES III Laboratory Data File. To compute these weights, final MEC+home examination weights were first adjusted for the random half selection, then adjusted for the nonresponse to assigned session, and finally, post-stratified to the unpublished Current Population Survey 1990 and 1993 population control estimates of the U.S. population adjusted for undercount. Eligible MEC+home examined persons who were assigned to the afternoon or evening sessions and examined in another session have a sampling weight of zero and should be excluded in analyses. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

WTPQRP1--WTPQRP52: Fay's BRR Replicate interview sample

To allow for alternative methods to estimate variance, 52 replicate weights were computed using repeated sampling method where WESVAR or other software that use repeated samples, can be used for estimating variance. Fay's method (see Fay, 1990; Judkins, 1990) was used to draw half samples and adjust sampling weights in each of the random half samples. Sampling weights in one half sample were multiplied by the factor k=1.7 and in the other half sample by k=0.3 using the Fay's method. After this adjustment, sampling weights were further adjusted for non-response and post-stratified using the same procedure as the final full sample interview weights. These weights should be used only for estimating variance of items from the household adult and youth interviews. For details, see Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996). WTPXRP1--WTPXRP52: Fay's BRR Replicate weights for MEC- examined sample

To allow for alternative methods to estimate variance, 52 replicate weights were computed using repeated sampling method where WESVAR or other BRR type software can be used to estimate variance. Fay's method (see Fay, 1990; Judkins, 1990) was used to draw half samples and adjust sampling weights in each of the random half samples. Sampling weights in one half sample were multiplied by the factor k=1.7 and in the other half sample by k=0.3 using Fay's method. After this adjustment, weights were further adjusted for nonresponse and were post-stratified using the same procedure as the full sample final weights. These weights should be used only for estimating variance of outcome measurements or interview items from the MEC Examination. For details, see additional information on this subject in Weighting and Estimation Methodology (U.S. DHHS, 1996) and NHANES III Analytic and Reporting Guidelines (U.S. DHHS, 1996).

Household Youth Questionnaire

HYAITMO: Age in months (Household Youth Interview)

Age in months was calculated by computing number of months between Household Youth Interview date and the date of birth. It was created for special analyses where exact age at the interview may be needed. This computed age may be different from the self-reported age in HSAGEIR and HSAGEU, or HSAITMOR. For most analyses, age reported in HSAGEIR (and HSAGEU) should be used.

MEC Examination

MXPLANG: Language of MEC examination

This variables designates the language of conduct for the MEC examination. questionnaires were designed to be implemented in a bilingual (English/Spanish) format so that respondents could to be interviewed in their preferred language. When it was necessary to conduct an interview in a another language, a translator assisted the interviewer in administering the questionnaires. These interviews were coded as other.

MXPSESSR: Examination session for MEC examinees

This variable designates the period during the day that the examination occurred. To increase response rates and allow flexibility, examinations were scheduled in three sessions: morning, afternoon and evening. On occasion, more than one session was attended in order to complete the full examination. In such a situation, the session was coded as the one when most of the examinations were completed.

MXPAXTMR: Age in months at MEC examination

Age in total months was created for special analyses where exact age at the examination may be needed (e.g., computation of growth charts). It was calculated by computing number of months between examination date and the date of birth. Some examinees may have had a birthday between household interview and examination so that this computed age at examination may differ slightly from the age reported in HSAGEIR (and HSAGEU), or HSAITMOR. For most analyses age reported in HSAGEIR (and HSAGEU) should be used. Ages of 1080 months and older (90 years and older) were recoded into a single category of 1080+ months to protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

Home Examination

HXPAXTMR: Age in months at home examination

Age in total months was created for special analyses where exact age at the examination may be needed (e.g., computation of growth charts). It was calculated by computing number of months between examination date and the date of birth. Some examinees may have had a birthday between household interview and examination so that this computed age at examination may differ slightly from the age reported in HSAGEIR (and HSAGEU), or HSAITMOR. For most analyses age reported in HSAGEIR (and HSAGEU) should be used. Ages of 1080 months and older (90 years and older) were recoded into a single category of 1080+ months to protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HXPSESSR: Examination session for home examinees

This variable designates the period during the day that the examination occurred. To increase response rates and allow flexibility, examinations were scheduled in three sessions: morning, afternoon and evening. On occasion, more than one session was attended in order to complete the full examination. In such a situation, the session was coded as the one when most of the examinations were completed.

Family Questionnaire Notes

HFVERS: Version of household family questionnaire

During the six years of the survey, portions of the Family Questionnaire were modified several times resulting in four different versions. Questions were dropped, revised, or added to meet divergent research needs. Changes were made in the ordering of selected questions, in the reference time period, and in the wording of questions. Versions 1 and 2 were implemented during Phase 1, and Versions 3 and 4 were implemented during Phase 2. Versions 3 and 4 vary only by implementation mode; Version 3 was conducted by pencil and paper and Version 4 was conducted using the computer-assisted personal interview (CAPI). The Family Questionnaire printed in the Plan and Operation of the Third National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (U.S. DHHS, 1996) most

closely resembles the final version. During the editing of this data file, variables from different versions were put together where feasible to enable analysis of complete six-year data for as many variables as possible. Notes elaborating question modifications are provided in this document. Users should carefully examine the differences to determine how to conduct analyses. HFVERS can be used

to identify the sample persons who were administered each version.

HFLANG: Language of household family questionnaire

This variable designates the language of conduct for the Family Questionnaire. Questionnaires were designed to be implemented in a bilingual (English/Spanish) format so that respondents could to be interviewed in their preferred language. When it was necessary to conduct an interview in another language, a translator assisted the interviewer in administering the questionnaires. These interviews were coded as "Other".

Individual Characteristics

HFA6XCR: In what state or foreign country was -- born?

This recoded variable derived from question A6 in the Household Family Questionnaire. Place of birth was regrouped into three broad categories in order to maintain confidentiality of the survey participant.

HFA8R: What is the highest grade or year of regular school -- has completed?

This recoded variable was created from two separate questions A7 and A8. Question A7 asked "What is the highest grade/year of regular school -- has ever attended?" Question A8 asked "Did you finish that grade/year?"

HFB1-HFB17: Health insurance coverage questions

Three versions of the health insurance questions were asked during the survey. The major difference was the time frame referenced for recall (e.g. "now" versus "in the last month"). Some questions had slight variations in the wording across versions; others may have been omitted from one version but added in another. When differences in versions were slight, the variable was created for the full survey time period. When differences were significant, version-specific variables were maintained. The variable HFVERS can be used to identify version. Separate notes are provided to show differences by version. Because of many changes for this section of questions, data may not be available for all survey participants

HFB1: Medicare coverage of all SPs in the family

This question differed in the time frame referenced for recall. Versions 1 and 2 read, "Is anyone in the family NOW covered by Medicare?" Versions 3 and 4 read "DURING THE LAST MONTH was anyone in the family covered by Medicare?"

HFB2: Medicare coverage of specific family members

This question differed in the time frame referenced for recall. Versions 1 and 2 read, "Is -- NOW covered by Medicare?" Versions 3 and 4 read, "DURING THE LAST MONTH was -- covered by Medicare?"

HFB4: Medicare coverage for hospital bills

This question refers to specific coverage for hospital bills. The versions differed in the time frame referenced for recall. Versions 1 and 2 read, "Is -- NOW covered by the part of Medicare that pays for hospital bills?" Versions 3 and 4 read, "DURING THE LAST MONTH was -- covered by the part of Medicare that pays for hospital bills?"

HFB5: Medicare coverage for doctor bills

Medicare has an optional feature that requires additional funds and helps to pay for doctor bills. The different versions varied in the time frame referenced for recall. Versions 1 and 2 read, "Does --'s Medicare pay for doctor's bills?" Versions 3 and 4 read, "DURING THE LAST MONTH was -covered by the part of Medicare that pays for doctor's bills?"

HFB6: Medicaid coverage of any SPs in the family

This question refers to the national program called Medicaid which pays for health care for persons in need. The different versions varied in the time frame referenced for recall. Versions 1 and 2 read, "DURING THE PAST 12 MONTHS was anyone in the family covered by Medicaid?" Versions 3 and 4 read, "DURING THE LAST MONTH was anyone in the family covered by Medicaid?" HFB7: Medicaid coverage for specific persons in the family

This question differs by version in the time frame referenced for recall. Versions 1 and 2 read, "At any time DURING THE LAST 12 MONTHS was -covered by Medicaid?" Versions 3 and 4 read, "DURING THE LAST MONTH was -covered by Medicaid?"

HFB8: Coverage by CHAMPUS, CHAMPVA, the VA, or military health care of any SPs in the family

This question was not asked on Version 1 of the questionnaire, and had time frame variations between Versions 2 and 3 and 4. Version 2 reads, "DURING THE PAST 12 MONTHS was anyone in the family covered by CHAMPUS/CHAMPVA, the VA or military health care?" Versions 3 and 4 read, "DURING THE LAST MONTH was anyone in the family covered by CHAMPUS/CHAMPVA, the VA or military health care?"

HFB9: Coverage by CHAMPUS, CHAMPVA, the VA, or military health care of specific persons in the family

This question was not asked on Version 1, and had time frame variations between Versions 2 and 3 and 4. Version 2 reads, "DURING THE PAST 12 MONTHS was -- covered by CHAMPUS/CHAMPVA, the VA or military health care?" Version 3 and 4 read, "DURING THE LAST MONTH was -- covered by CHAMPUS/CHAMPVA, the VA or military health care?"

HFB10: Coverage by health insurance plans obtained privately or through an employer or union for any SPs in the family

This question changed in wording, and in time frame between all versions versions of the questionnaire. For Versions 1 and 2, the frame of reference was NOW. For Versions 3 and 4, the frame of reference was DURING

THE LAST MONTH. For Versions 1 and 3 and 4 the introductory statement read, "We are interested in all kinds of health insurance plans except those that pay only for accidents." The Version 2 introductory statement read, "We are interested in all kinds of private health insurance except those that pay only for accidents."

Version 1 of the question read, "(Not counting Medicare) is anyone in the family NOW covered by a health insurance plan that pays any part of a hospital, doctor's, or surgeon's bill?" Version 2 of the question reads, "(Not counting Medicare, Medicaid, or Veteran's payments) is anyone in the family NOW covered by a health insurance plan obtained privately or through a current or former employer or union that pays any part of a hospital, doctor's, or surgeon's bill?" Versions 3 and 4 of the question read, "(Not counting Medicare, Medicaid, or Veteran's payments) DURING THE LAST MONTH was anyone in the family covered by a health insurance plan obtained privately or through a current or former employer or union that pays any part of a hospital stay or routine doctor's care? Include membership in a health maintenance organization." HFB11 and HFB11A-HFB11E: Coverage by health insurance plans obtained privately or through an employer or union for specific family members

Questions HFB11A-HFB11E follow from the lead-in question HFB11. The time frame for all of the questions is dependent upon the version of the lead-in question. Version 1 read, "Is -- NOW covered by a health insurance plan?" Version 2 read, "Is -- covered by a health insurance plan?" Versions 3 and 4 read, "During the LAST MONTH was -- covered by a health insurance plan obtained privately or through an employer or union?" Many of the questions that follow are version-specific, as noted.

HFB11B: Coverage of routine doctor's care from health insurance plans obtained privately or through an employer or union

This question was asked only on Versions 3 and 4 of the questionnaire.

HFB11C: Dental care coverage of health insurance plans obtained privately or through an employer or union

This question was not asked in Version 1 of the questionnaire.

HFB11D: Insurance plan from former employer or union rather than obtained privately

This question was asked only on Version 3 of the questionnaire.

HFB11E: Coverage of doctor's or surgeon's bills for operations from health insurance plans obtained privately or through an employer or union

This question was asked only on Versions 1 and 2.

HFB12: Has --- ever been refused health insurance or limited in the kind of insurance coverage

This question was asked only on Versions 3 and 4 of the questionnaire.

HFB14AA-HFB14BI: Reasons for not having health insurance

The response categories for this question differed significantly by version and were therefore all included. A respondent could give multiple responses for this question. HFB14AA and HFB14AH were possible responses in Version 1. HFB14BA-HFB14BI were possible responses in Version 2.

HFB16A and HFB16B: Main reason -- not covered by health insurance

These were retained as separate variables because the response categories for the question differed significantly by Version. Categories for question 16A were included in Versions 1 and 2. Categories for question 16B were included in Versions 3 and 4.

HFB17: Health insurance that pays any part of dental care

This was asked only on Version 1 of the questionnaire. The question for variable HFB11C (Versions 2,3 and 4) also dealt with dental care coverage, though had different criteria in its lead-in question.

HFC2S: How much (does --'s mother/do you) weigh? (pounds)

This variable was created from question C2 to standardize responses to pounds. For responses in kilograms the conversion factor 2.2046 kilograms/pound.

HFC3S: How tall (is --'s mother/are you)? (inches)

This variable was created from question C3 to standardize responses to inches. For responses in centimeters, the conversion factor was 0.3937 centimeters/inch.

HFC4S: How much (does --'s father/do you) weigh? (pounds)

This variable was created from question C4 to standardize responses to pounds. For responses in kilograms the conversion factor 2.2046 kilograms/pound.

HFC5S: How tall (is --'s father/are you)? (inches)

This variable was created from question C3 to standardize responses to inches. For responses in centimeters, the conversion factor was 0.3937 centimeters/inch.

HFC7S: How long has -- lived at this address? (weeks)

This standardized variable was created from the two-part question (quantity and unit) C7 using the conversion factors 4.3 weeks/month and 52 weeks/year. If the response was "whole life", then the time was converted to weeks based on age at interview (HSAGEIR and HSAGEU).

HFC8s: How long has -- lived in this (city/town/area)? (weeks)

This variable was created from the two part question (quantity and unit) C8 using the conversion factors 4.3 weeks/month and 52 weeks/year. If the response was "whole life", then the time was converted to weeks based on age at interview (HSAGEIR and HSAGEU).

HFD1, HFD9R, HFD10R, HFD12: Questions on occupation of the Family Reference Person (FRP)

These questions were asked about the occupation of FRPs only if they were not sample persons. FRPs who were also sample persons responded to questions on occupation in the Household Adult Questionnaire (HAS1-HAS29).

For additional information on the FRP from the Family Questionnaire, see variables that begin with the prefix HSH.

HFD9R: Business or industry of Family Reference Person

Classification of business or industry based on categories defined by the U.S. Bureau of Census in 1980 (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1981).

HFD10R: Occupation of Family Reference Person

Classification of occupation based on categories defined by the U.S. Bureau of Census in 1980 (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1981).

HFD12: Class of worker Family Reference Person (FRP)

The category armed forces was added in Versions 3 and 4. In the earlier version, armed force status can be ascertained from HFD9. In Versions 3 and 4,FRPs who were in active military service skipped out of the detailed occupational questions in this section.

HFE1: Year house was built

A small number of sample persons were unable to answer this question because they reported living in mobile homes. Since there was not category for this response, they were included as blank but applicable.

HFF2R: Total number of persons who smoke cigarettes in the home

This total was derived by counting the number of persons recorded as smoking in the home (questions F1 and F2).

HFF4-HFF8: Food Insufficiency

The intent of these questions was to capture insufficient food availability

at the family level due to lack of money and/or other resources as answered by the respondent to the Family Questionnaire. Related questions answered by individuals or their proxies were asked following the 24-hour dietary recall in the MEC (See NHANES III Dietary Data File).

HFF6: Reasons for no food or money to buy food

More than one response could be answered yes for question F6. Textual responses to this question were reviewed and coded into existing categories HFF6A-HFF6C where possible. Remaining responses which could not be coded back into existing questions, such as health reasons, are included in HFF6D as "Other."

HFF7 and HFF8: Size of meals cut

Questions F7 and F8 were asked only in Versions 3 and 4. The variable HFVERS can be used to select only those records for sample persons who were asked these questions. The purpose of the questions was to ascertain information on cutting back or skipping meals as a coping strategy for not having enough food in the family.

HFF9: WIC participation in family

WIC is the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants, and Children administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Question F9 was asked also of individuals or their proxies during the interviews that took place in the MEC and home examinations. (See NHANES III Examination Data File)

HFF10 and HFF11: Food Stamp Program participation in family

Food stamps refers to the Food Stamp Program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

HFF12A-HFF17B: Types of family income

Questions F12 through F17 were structured similarly. The first part of the question asked whether any family member received a certain type of income.

The second part of the question indicated the recording of the line number(s) for the person(s) who received the income. Because the line number from the Household Screener Composition Table will not be released, the second part of the question will contain only the response for the specific sample person to which a record refers.

HFF13A: Social Security or Railroad Retirement payments in family

The time frame as well as the wording changed in this question. In Versions 1 and 2, the frame of reference was THE PAST 12 MONTHS. In Versions 3 and 4, the frame of reference was the LAST MONTH. Versions 1 and 2 read "DURING THE PAST 12 MONTHS did any member of the family receive any Social Security payments?" Version 3 and 4 read "DURING THE LAST MONTH did anyone in the family receive any Social Security or Railroad Retirement payments?"

HFF13DA-HFF13DB: Reason for receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement payments

The response categories for question F13d changed significantly between Versions 1 and 2 and Versions 3 and 4 so that the question was retained by version.

HFF13E: Another reason for receiving Social Security payments

In Versions 1 and 2, respondents were asked to state another reason that they were receiving Social Security.

HFF14A: Supplemental Security Income payments in family

The time frame changed in this question. In Versions 1 and 2, the frame of reference was THE PAST 12 MONTHS. In Versions 3 and 4, the frame of

reference was the LAST MONTH. Versions 1 and 2 read "DURING THE PAST 12 MONTHS did anyone in the family receive SSI (Supplemental Security Income) payments from the U.S./Federal government?" Version 3 and 4 read "DURING THE LAST MONTH did anyone in the family receive SSI (Supplemental Security Income) payments from the Federal government?" HFF14B: Supplemental Security Income payments to SP

The time frame changed in this question. In Versions 1 and 2 the frame of reference was THE PAST 4 MONTHS. In Version 3 and 4 the frame of reference was THE LAST MONTH. Versions 1 and 2 read"DURING THE PAST 4 MONTHS, did -- receive SSI payments from the U.S./Federal government?" Version 3 and 4 reads "DURING THE LAST MONTH, did -- receive SSI payments from the Federal government?"

HFF14D: Supplemental Security Income payments from State or local welfare office

Question F14d was asked only in Versions 1 and 2 of the questionnaire. The variable HFVERS should be used to select only those records for sample persons who were asked this question.

HFF15A-HFF16B: Pension or disability payments- Public assistance or welfare payments

Questions F15a-F16b were asked only in Version 3 and 4. The variable HFVERS should be used to select only those records for sample persons who were asked this question.

HFF16D-HFF16E: Aid to Families with Dependent Children payments

Questions F16d and F16e were asked only in Versions 2 and 3 of the questionnaire. The time frame was modified between the last two versions. For question F16d, Version 2 read "Does anyone in the family NOW receive assistance through the "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" Program, sometimes called "AFDC" or "ADC"?" Version 3 and 4 read "DURING THE LAST MONTH did anyone in the family receive "Aid to Families with Dependent Children", sometimes called AFDC or ADC?" For question F16e, Version 2 read "Is -- included in the AFDC assistance payment?" Version 3 and 4 read "DURING THE LAST MONTH, did -- receive "Aid to Families with Dependent Children," sometimes called AFDC or ADC?"

HFF17A-HFF17B: Income from any other source

These questions were asked only in Version 3. The variable HFVERS should be used to select only those records for sample persons who were asked these questions. HFF19R: Family income during last 12 months

The response categories were changed between Versions 1 and 2 and Version 3 and 4 of the questionnaire. In Versions 1 and 2, the response categories for question F19 ended with the category "\$50,000 and over" (coded 27) In Version 3 and 4, the categories were expanded to include four that were over \$50,000.

- 27 \$50,000-\$59,000
- 28 \$60,000-\$69,000
- 29 \$70,000-\$79,000
- 30 \$80,000 and over

Variable HFF19R is a recoded variable based on response categories for Versions 1 and 2. For comparability, responses to categories over \$50,000 in Versions 3 and 4 were collapsed back into the single category "\$50,000 and over."

HFF20R: Family income during last month

Respondents were allowed to indicate that their family income during the last month was the annual income reported in question F19 divided by 12. For these responses, the monthly income was imputed by dividing the midpoint of the range selected in question F19 by 12. The response categories were changed between Versions 1 and 2 d Version 3 of the questionnaire. In Versions 1 and 2, the response categories for question F20 ended with the category "4,000 and over" (coded 20) In Version 3 and 4, the categories were expanded to include:

- 20 \$4,000-\$4,999 21 \$5,000-\$5,999 22 \$6,000-\$6,999
- 23 \$7,000 and over

Variable HFF20R is a recoded variable created using the response categories for Versions 1 and 2. For comparability, responses in Versions 3 and 4 to the expanded categories were collapsed back into the single category "\$4,000 and over." Family Reference Person

HFHSEQN: Sequence number for Family Reference Person (FRP)

This variable is the unique identifier for the family reference person (FRP). The FRP was designated during the Screener interview as the person 17 years of age or older who owned or rented the dwelling unit. If no one owned or rented the unit, then the family reference was the first family member mentioned by the Screener respondent who was 17 years of age. The FRP was established in order to arrange household members into family units. In earlier NHANES and in parts of the NHANES III interview questionnaires, the FRP was referred to as "the head of the household." (For more details, see the chapter on "Administering the Interview" in the NHANES III Interviewer's Manual, U.S DHHS, 1996.)

HFHAGER: Age of the Family Reference Person (FRP)

Question A3 of the Family questionnaire asked the age (transcribed from the Screener) of the FRP and of each sample person. See HSAGEIR and HSAGEU for the age at interview (Screener Interview) of sample persons.

HFHSEX: Sex of the Family Reference Person (FRP)

Question A4 of the Family questionnaire asked the sex of the FRP and of each sample person. See HSSEX for the sex of sample persons.

HFHFIPR: Place of birth Family Reference Person (FRP)

This recoded variable was derived from question A6 in the Household Family Questionnaire. Place of birth was regrouped into three broad categories in order to maintain confidentiality of the survey participant. See HFA6XCR

HFHEDUCR: Highest grade completed Family Reference Person (FRP)

This recoded variable was created from two separate questions A7 and A8 in the Family questionnaire. These questions were asked of all sample persons as well as of the FRP. Question A7 asked "What is the highest grade/year of regular school -- has ever attended?" Question A8 asked "Did you finish that grade/year?" Persons who did not complete the grade answered in A7, were coded to having completed one previous grade. See HFA8R for completed years of education for sample persons.

HFHEMPL: Employment status of Family Reference Person (FRP)

This derived variable combines responses from questions D2 and D3 of the Family questionnaire for FRPs who were not sample persons, and from questions S1 and S2 of the Household Adult questionnaire for FRPs who were also sample persons. For more detail on the occupation of the FRP see: variables HFD1, HFD9R, HFD10R and HFD12.

HFHMRST: Marital status of Family Reference Person (FRP)

Question A12 asked the marital status of the FRP and the sample person. See HFA12 for the marital status of sample persons.

HFHMLSV: Military service of Family Reference Person (FRP)

Question A13 of the Family questionnaire asked whether the FRP or the sample person ever served in the Armed Forces. Persons who were serving in the military at the time of the interview, but living at home, were permitted to be only Family Reference Persons, not sample persons. See HFA13 for the military service of sample persons.

HFRELR: Relationship of respondent to the Family Reference person

No other information, except for age (HFAGERR), is available on respondents to the Family Questionnaire who were not sample persons or family reference persons.

HFAGERR: Age of respondent

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

Household Adult Questionnaire

HAA4-HAA6D: Orientation

These questions on mental cognition were asked only of self-responding sample persons 60 and older; not to proxy respondents. These questions along with questions HAP17A1-HAP19C of the Household Adult Questionnaire and the Cognitive Function Tests (Parts A and B) found on the both the Home Examination Questionnaire and the Mobile Examination Center Adult Questionnaire were constituents of a mental status examination (Folstein, Folstein, and McHugh, 1975 and Albert el al.,1991).

HAB6S: Number of months since last saw medical provider

This variable was created from the two part question (number and unit) B6 using the conversion factor 12 months/year.

HAC3AR, HA3DR, HAC3ER, HAC3FR, HAC3GR, HAC3HR, HAC3IR, HAC3JR, HAC3KR, HAC3LR, HAC3MR, HAC3NR, HAC3OR: Age when first told had medical condition (years)

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAC5A10, HAC5A11, HAC5A12: Did son, daughter, or other relative have diabetes?

During Phase 2 (years 5 and 6 only), son and daughter were added as response categories to the list of family members who were told by a doctor that they had diabetes. Remaining responses (other relatives) that could not be coded back into existing categories were included in HAC5A12.

HAC5B10, HAC5B11, HAC5B12: Did son, daughter or other relative have heart

attack before age 50?

During Phase 2 (years 5 and 6 only), son and daughter were added as response categories to the list of family members who were told by a doctor that they had a heart attack before age 50. Remaining responses (other relatives) that could not be coded back into existing categories were included in HAC5B12.

HAD5R: How old were you when a doctor told you that you had diabetes?

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAD7S: About how often do you take insulin? (times per week)

This variable was created from the two part (number and unit) question D7 using the conversion factor 7 days/week.

HAD9S: For how long have you been taking insulin? (months)

This variable was created from the two part (number and unit) question D9 using the conversion factor 12 months/year.

HAD11AS: How often do you check yourself for glucose or sugar in your urine?

This variable was standardized to "times per month" from the two part (number and unit) question D11A using the conversion factors 30.4 days/month and 4.3 weeks/month.

HAD11BS: How often do you check yourself for glucose or sugar in your blood?

This variable was standardized to "times per month" from the two part (number and unit) question D11B using the conversion factors 30.4 days/month and 4.3 weeks/month.

HAD12S: Last time had eyes examined by a doctor

The response to question D12 was standardized to using the conversion factors 7 days per week, 30.4 days per month, and 365 days per year.

HAD13S: Time since last eye exam in which pupils were dilated

The response to question D13 was standardized to using the conversion factors 7 days per week, 30.4 days per month, and 365 days per year.

HAF4: What do you do if you get pain while walking?

This question, and others in this section, are from the London School of Hygiene Cardiovascular Questionnaire, including the Rose Angina, Possible Infarction, and Intermittent Claudication questions (Rose GA, Blackburn H, Gillum RF, and Prineas RJ, 1982). When the questionnaire was converted to a computer-assisted personal interview (CAPI), some changes were made to the questionnaire to improve the flow of the interview. Based on frequent comments from respondents, an additional response category was added for this question: "does not get pain in chest while walking." For any analysis where there is interest in this response, only those respondents who had the option of selecting this response category should be included. Use HAVERS to select questionnaire version and phase.

HAF7A-HAF7H: Part of chest where pain is located

All parts of the chest where pain was located were recorded. Responses to the follow-up question (F8) "do you feel it anywhere else?" were coded back into the existing response categories for question F7, and are therefore included in these variables. Analysts should refer to the cardiovascular section of the Household Adult Questionnaire (page 131) in the Plan and Operation of NHANES III (U.S. DHHS, 1996) for the drawing identifying numbered areas.

HAF12R, HAF13R: Age when had first and last heart attacks (years)

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+

years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAG4A-HAG4C: Part of back where pain is usually located

Analysts should refer to the musculoskeletal conditions section of the Household Adult Questionnaire (page 133) in the Plan and Operation of NHANES III (U.S.DHHS, 1996) for the drawing identifying numbered areas.

HAG6A-HAG6C: Number of fractures

The questions on the number of times specific bones (hip, wrist, and spine) were fractured were followed by questions on age at the time of the fracture and the cause for each fracture. This additional information was only collected on the first 6 fractures.

HAG9AR-HAG9ER: Age at time of fracture for each site

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAG17A-HAG17EE: Painful or stiff joints in hands

Analysts should refer to the musculoskeletal conditions section of the Household Adult Questionnaire (page 135) in the Plan and Operation of NHANES III (U.S. DHHS, 1996) for the drawings identifying numbered areas.

HAG19A-HAG19EE: Swelling joints in hands

Analysts should refer to the musculoskeletal conditions section of the Household Adult Questionnaire (page 136) in the Plan and Operation of NHANES III (U.S. DHHS, 1996) for the drawings identifying numbered areas.

HAJ1-HAJ2C: Pain related to gallbladder disease

Analysts should refer to gallbladder disease section of the Household Adult Questionnaire (page 139) in the Plan and Operation of NHANES III (U.S. DHHS, 1996) for the drawing identifying numbered areas.

HAJ3S: Longest time for one episode of pain reported (minutes)

This variable was standardized to time in minutes for the responses to question J3 using the conversion factors 24 hours/day and 60 minutes/ hour.

HAJ8: What did the doctor say caused the pain?

Most of the causes for pain reported in the "other" specified category were recoded into response categories.

HAJ10: Reason visited doctor the time he told you that you had gallstones

Most of the causes for pain reported in the "other" specified category were recoded into response categories.

HAJ18R: Age when had gallbladder surgery (years)

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAK3B1R, HAK3C1R: Age related to treatment of gallstones (years)

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAM55: Reported height without shoes (inches)

This variable was standardized to inches using the conversion factors 0.3937 inches per centimeter, and 12 inches per foot.

HAM6S: Reported weight without clothes (lbs)

This variable was standardized to weight in pounds using the conversion factor 2.2046 pounds per kilogram.

HAM8S-HAM10S: Reported weight at different times in past (lbs)

These variables were standardized to weight in pounds using the conversion factor 2.2046 pounds per kilogram.

HAN1AS, HAN1BS, HAN1ES-HAN7CS, HAN8AS-HAN8FS: Frequency of consumption of food item per month

Respondents were asked how often over the past month they had eaten specified food items. The foods were listed in groups, targeting those high in vitamins A and C and calcium. Interviewers also probed for other food and beverage items (HAN8AS-HAN8FS). The series of questions were identical to the dietary food frequency questions administered to youths 12 - 16 years in the mobile examination center (see NHANES III Examination Data File). It is important to note that portion sizes were not defined, and responses represent "number or times" as determined by the respondent. Thus, analysts should be aware of possible extreme values. Foods were reported as number of times consumed per day, per week, per month, or never. All frequency of consumption variables were standardized as "times per month" using the conversion factors 4.3 weeks/month and 30.4 days/month rounded to the nearest whole number. If the frequency of consumption was reported as "never," the value was recorded as zero.

HAND1: Usual type of milk consumed

Only usual milk consumed was recorded here. If more than one milk type was reported as "usual," the first milk reported was recorded. Guidelines based on fat content were developed in order to recode other milks that were reported but not listed and to create new categories.

HAN8ACD, HAN8BCD, HAN8CCD, HAN8DCD, HAN8ECD, HAN8FCD: New codes for other missed foods/beverages

Respondents also were asked about other foods not listed in the food frequency questionnaire. Responses to this question from both the adult and the youth food frequency questionnaires were edited by first determining whether the food could be coded back into an existing category. When possible, the frequency of consumption of that food was added to the original response for the pre-existing category. If the original response was "Never consumed," then the consumption frequency for the "Other food not listed" replaced the original response. Foods that were reported using frequency units were first converted to a common unit; the frequencies were summed to produce whole number estimates. For example, if the reported frequency for the category "Other vegetables" was once per day and asparagus consumption once per week was reported for "other food not listed," then the frequency for asparagus consumption was added to the frequency of the "Other vegetables" category and recalculated as a consumption of eight per week. When it was not possible to recode a response, a determination was made about whether a new category should be created based on the reported frequency of the food or whether the food represented an important source of a specific nutrient. The following eight new food groups were defined:

- 01 Egg substitutes
- 02 Decaffeinated coffee and espresso
- 03 Decaffeinated/herbal tea
- 04 Sports drinks, fruit drinks (excluding juices but including tamarind drinks), and popsicles
- 05 Water, including tap, mineral, spring, seltzer, soda
- 06 Soy products, including tofu, soy milk, soy ice cream, soy cheese, soy hamburgers, soy hot dogs, soy flour, and textured vegetable protein
- 07 Non-alcoholic beer/wine

08 Others not specified or not elsewhere classified, including diet, breakfast, and nutrition drinks, pudding, condiments, sour or whipped cream, granola bars, and gelatin

HAR4S: Number of cigarettes smoked per day

This variable was created from the two-part question (quantity and unit) R4 using the conversion factor 20 cigarettes/pack.

HAR7S: Number of cigarettes smoked per day when smoked the most

This variable was created from the two-part question (quantity and unit) R7 using the conversion factor 20 cigarettes/pack.

HAR11R: Age when last smoked fairly regularly (years)

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAR12S: Number of cigarettes smoked per day before quit smoking

This variable was created from the two-part question (quantity and unit) R12 using the conversion factor 20 cigarettes/pack.

HAR18AS: Number of containers of snuff used per week

This variable was created from the two-part question (quantity and unit) R18 using the conversion factor seven days/week.

HAR18BS: Number of containers of chew used per week

This variable was created from the two-part question (quantity and unit) R18 using the conversion factor seven days/week.

HAR20R: Age when last used chew or snuff (years)

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAS8R: Business or industry

The classification of business of industry was based on categories defined by the U.S. Bureau of Census in 1980 (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1981).

HAS9R: Occupation

The classification of occupation was based on categories defined by the U.S. Bureau of Census in 1980 (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1981).

HAS12S: For how long worked at job (months)

This variable was created from the two-part question (quantity and unit) S12 using the conversion factor 12 months/year.

HAS17R: Longest held occupation

The classification of occupation was based on categories defined by the U.S. Bureau of Census in 1980 (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1981).

HAS19R: Business for the longest held occupation (as reported in HAS17R)

The classification of business was based on categories defined by the U.S. Bureau of Census in 1980 (U.S. Bureau of the Census, 1981).

HAT1S-HAT26S: In the past month number of times did specified exercise

Respondents were asked how frequently they performed specified leisure time exercise or physical activities in the past month. Responses were standardized as "times per month" using the conversion factors 4.3 weeks/month and 30.4 days/month, rounded to the nearest whole number. Responses of 100 times per month or more were categorized as "100+". The frequency of performance of other reported exercises, sports, or physically active hobbies was also recorded (HAT20S, HAT22S, HAT24S, HAT26S).

HAT1MET-HAT16MET, HAT19MET-HAT25MET: Activity codes and intensity ratings

Physical activities were coded and classified by rate of energy expenditure (i.e. by intensity) according to a standardized coding scheme developed by Ainsworth BE, Haskell WL, Leon AS, et al. (Ainsworth, 1993). The coding scheme uses five digits that classify activity by purpose, the specific type of activity, and its intensity as the ratio of work metabolic rate to resting metabolic rate (METs). Listed activities, as well as other activities reported (HAT19MET-HAT25MET) were assigned intensity ratings. A list of the codes and intensity ratings are found in Appendix 2.

HAT19CD-HAT25CD: Other activities (coded)

After administering the list of specified physical activities, interviewers probed for other exercises, sports or physically active hobbies not mentioned. Activities were coded and classified by rate of energy expenditure (i.e. by intensity) according to a standardized coding scheme developed by Ainsworth BE, Haskell WL, Leon AS, et al (Ainsworth, 1993). A list of the codes and intensity ratings are found in Appendix 2.

HAV1S: Number of phone calls per week with family and friends

This variable was created from the two part question (number and unit) V1 using the conversion factor 7 days/week.

HAV2S: Number of visits per year with friends and relatives

This variable was created from the two part question (number and unit)

V2 using the conversion factors 365 days/year, 52 weeks/year, and 12 months/year.

HAV3S: Number of times per year visits with neighbors

This variable was created from the two part question (number and unit) V3 using the conversion factors 365 days/year, 52 weeks/months, and 12 months/year.

HAV4S: Number of times per year attends church

This variable was created from the two part question (number and unit) V4 using the conversion factors 365 days/year, 52 weeks/year, and 12 months/year.

HAV6S: Number of times per year attends club meetings

This variable was created from the two part question (number and unit) V6 using the conversion factors 365 days/year, 52 weeks/year, and 12 months/year.

HAV7R: Number of weeks lived at this address

This variable was created from the two part question (number and unit) V7 using the conversion factors 4.3 weeks/months and 52 weeks/year.

HAV10R: Country where lived longest

This recoded variable was derived from question V10. Responses were regrouped into three broad categories in order to maintain confidentiality of the survey participant.

HAV12R: In what state or country were you born?

This recoded variable was derived from question V12. Responses were regrouped into three broad categories in order to maintain confidentiality of the survey participant.

HAV13R: How long have you lived in the United States?

Ages of 90 years or greater were recoded into a single category of 90+ years to help protect the confidentiality of survey participants.

HAX1A: Have you taken any vitamins or minerals in the past month?

This variable is the response to a lead-in question for a series of questions on vitamins and mineral supplements. If the response was yes, then respondents were asked the number of supplements they took. For each supplement taken respondents were asked about how often the supplement was taken, the dosage, and duration of use. Analysts should be aware, however, that there were respondents who reported taking supplements, but did not answer some or all of the remaining questions about the supplements. Although the lead-in question was designed to determine whether respondents were using any vitamin or mineral supplements, respondents often reported taking other types of dietary supplements such as formula diets, sports drinks, herbs, products, amino acids, bee pollen, lipotropics, fish oils, and enzymes. This information was retained along with the vitamin/mineral supplements. However, since there were not probes for use of other vitamin/nonmineral dietary supplements, the frequency with which these products were reported can not be considered nationally representative. It should also be noted that all of the information from the section does not appear in this data file; additional variables including supplement formulations will be released as a separate data file.

HAX1B: Have you taken or used any prescription medicines in the past month?

This variable is the response to a lead-in question for a series of questions on prescription medicines. If the response was yes, then the respondents were asked the number of prescription medicines they took. For each prescription medicine the respondent was asked to describe the health problem for which they took the medicine, and how long they had been taking the medicine. Analysts should be aware, however, that there were respondents who reported taking prescription medicines, but were only able to answer some of the remaining prescription drug questions. Prescribed vitamin or mineral supplements (e.g., fluoride, iron, and prenatal vitamins) originally reported as prescription drugs were moved to the vitamin/mineral section. These could, in fact, be considered either a drug or a supplement (e.g such as calcium-based antacid, calcitrol, and potassium. It should also be noted that all of the information from the section does not appear in this data file; additional variables including drug formulations will be released as a separate data file.

HAX1C: Have you taken antacids in the past month?

This variable is the response to a lead-in question for a series of questions on antacid use. If the response was yes, respondents were asked the number of antacids they took. For each antacid, respondents were asked how often it was taken, the dosage, and the duration of use. Antacids listed here are only those purchased over-the-counter. Prescription antacids were moved to the prescription medication section (HAX9-HAX12 variables). Some of these products are currently available without a prescription (e.g. "Zantac") but were available only by prescription at the time that the data were collected.

HAX2A: Number of vitamins or mineral supplements reported

This variable represents the total number of different supplements reported by the respondent. For each supplement, the interviewer asked to see the supplement container in order to record the name of the product and the manufacturer. If the container was not available, the interviewer probed for this information. Supplements that appear to be identical or duplications of another reported product are usually different forms (e.g., tablet vs. liquid) of the same product.

HAX2B: Number of prescription medicines reported

This variable represents the total number of different prescription medicines reported by the respondent. For each medication reported, the interviewer asked to see the medication container in order to record the name of the product. If the container was not available, the interviewer probed for this information. Reports of non-prescription drug use were deleted, or moved (as in the case of calcium-containing antacids). Medicines that appear to be identical or duplications of another reported product are usually different forms(e.g., tablet vs. liquid) of the same product.

HAX2C: Number of antacids reported

This variable represents the total number of different antacids reported by the respondent or proxy. For each antacid reported, the interviewer asked to see the container in order to record the name of the product. If the container was not available, the interviewer probed for this information.

HAX3CG, HAX3CH, HAX3CI, HAX3CJ, HAX3CK, HAX3CL, HAX3CM, HAX3CN, HAX3CO, HAX3CP, HAX3CQ, HAX3CR, HAX3CS, HAX3CT, HAX3CU, HAX3CV, HAX3CW : Certainty index codes for vitamin and mineral supplements

A certainty index was derived as a means of evaluating how closely the reported name of a dietary supplement matched a standard or brand name product which, in turn, was used for determining nutrient intakes. Each reported dietary supplement was assigned a certainty code. The index consists of six levels ranging from the highest degree of certainty that the reported supplement was correctly identified (code=1) to no level the lowest degree of certainty (code=6), i.e., no match could be made between the reported supplement and a standard supplement. More specifically, the code of 1 was used when the respondent provided enough information about the product that it exactly matched a specific brand name supplement. A code of 2 was applied when the product name was partially incomplete or misspelled, but generally identifiable. A code of 3 was used for cases where a single nutrient supplement, such as calcium, was reported without the concentration. A code of 4 was applied when a generic type of supplement was reported such as "children's chewable multivitamins" or "iron vitamins" when it was not possible to identify the specific brand name or nutrient composition. A code of 5 was assigned to supplements that could not be readily

identified although they were thought to be dietary supplements such as "Shaklee vitamins" or "Diamite nutritional". A code of 6 was used for products that could not be identified but were assumed to be a dietary supplement.

HAX3DG, HAX3DH, HAX3DI, HAX3DJ, HAX3DK, HAX3DL, HAX3DM, HAX3DN, HAX3DO, HAX3DP, HAX3DQ, HAX3DR, HAX3DS, HAX3DT, HAX3DU, HAX3DV, HAX3DW: Product class for vitamin and mineral supplements

Each reported dietary supplement was categorized into one of 7 broad product-type classes according to general nutrient composition. The first five classes (1-5) were assigned only to vitamin and/or mineral supplements. The remaining two classes (6 and 7) were assigned to other dietary supplements including amino acids, lipotropics, herbs, plants and other nontraditional dietary supplements. Dietary supplements that also contained a vitamin and/or a mineral (e.g., ginseng and bee pollen with vitamin E) were assigned to class 6, whereas those that did not include vitamins or minerals were assigned to class 7.

HAX6SG, HAX6SH, HAX6SI, HAX6SJ, HAX6SK, HAX6SL, HAX6SM, HAX6SN, HAX6SO, HAX6SP, HAX6SQ, HAX6SR, HAX6ST, HAX6SU, HAX6SV, HAX6SW How often did you take supplement in the past month?

These variables were created for each reported dietary supplement from the two-part (number and unit) question X6, and indicate how frequently each supplement was taken in the past month. The conversion factors used for days and weeks were 30 and 4, respectively. While frequency of use was standardized to "month," new supplement users may have been taking the supplement for less than a month at the time of the interview. Analysts, therefore, may want to examine duration (HAX8S variables) as well as frequency of use.

HAX8SG, HAX8SH, HAX8SI, HAX8SJ, HAX8SK, HAX8SL, HAX8SM, HAX8SN, HAX8SO, HAX8SP, HAX8SQ, HAX8SR, HAX8SS, HAX8ST, HAX8SU, HAX8SV, HAX8SW: How long have you been taking this product? (months)

This variable was created from the two-part (number and unit) question X8, and indicates the long-term duration of use. The conversion factor was 12 months/year. When supplements were reported as prescription drugs and then moved as part of the data editing process (see note for variable HAX1A) much of the information was not directly transferable. For example, categories for duration of taking drugs (HAX12S variables) did not always match those listed for the corresponding question for vitamin/mineral supplements (HAX8S variables). Responses reported in weeks were rounded to the nearest month, whereas response in months and years were transferred directly.

HAX9DG, HAX9DH, HAX9DI, HAX9DJ, HAX9DK, HAX9DL, HAX9DM, HAX9DN, HAX9DO: HAX9DP, HAX9DQ, HAX9DR, HAX9DS, HAX9DT, HAX9DU, HAX9DV: Primary drug class code

Up to three drug class codes were assigned for each reported prescription medication. These 4-digit codes were supplied by the Product Information Branch, Center for Drug Evaluation and Research at the U.S. DDHS Food and Drug Administration. The version of these codes that was used was last updated in October 1994. The primary drug class code assignment was based on the known drug action. For example, all cardiovascular drugs that were beta-adrenergic blocking agents were assigned the drug class code 0512 (beta blockers). See Appendix 3 for listing of codes.

HAX9EG, HAX9EH, HAX9EI, HAX9EJ, HAX9EK, HAX9EL, HAX9EM, HAX9EN, HAX9EO, HAX9EP, HAX9EQ, HAX9ER, HAX9ES, HAX9ET, HAX9EU, HAX9EV: Secondary drug class code

This variable contains the second drug class codes for each prescription drug reported. If the medical condition for which the medication was used (as reported in question X11) was different than the known drug action, then a secondary drug class code was entered. For example, a cardiovascular drug that was a beta-adrenergic blocking agent was assigned the drug class code 0512 (beta blocker) as the primary drug code, and a secondary drug class of 0502 (antiarrhythmic). If the reason provided did not relate to any of the known actions of the drug, then only the medication-specific (primary) class code was assigned. See Appendix 3 for listing of codes.

HAX9FG, HAX9FH, HAX9FI, HAX9FJ, HAX9FK, HAX9FL, HAX9FM, HAX9FN, HAX9FO, HAX9FP, HAX9FQ, HAX9FR, HAX9FS, HAX9FT, HAX9FU, HAX9FV: Tertiary drug class code

This variable contains the tertiary drug class codes for each prescription drug reported. If the medical condition for which the medication was used (as reported in question X11) was different than the primary drug class, then a secondary, and tertiary drug class code was entered. For example, a cardiovascular drug was assigned the drug class code 0512 (beta blocker) as the primary drug code, a secondary drug class code of 0502 (antiarrhythmics), and a tertiary code of 0506 (antihypertensives). If the reason provided did not relate to any of the actions of the drug, then only the medication-specific class code (primary)

was assigned. See Appendix 3 for listing of codes.

HAX11AG, HAX11AH, HAX11AI, HAX11AJ, HAX11AK, HAX11AL, HAX11AM, HAX11AN, HAX11AO, HAX11AP, HAX11AQ, HAX11AR, HAX11AS, HAX11AT, HAX11AU, HAX11AV: ICD-9-CM code for prescription medicine

ICD-9-CM codes were used to classify the medical conditions reported in question X11 for each prescription drug reported. Conditions were coded to the forth digit ICD-9-CM level of specificity except in those cases where the three digit ICD-9-CM code is the highest level of specificity. Some conditions where no appropriate code was available in the Classification of Diseases and Injuries ICD-9-CM codes, were coded using V Codes - Supplementary Classification of factors Influencing Health Status and Contact with Health Services. See Appendix 4 for listing of codes.

HAX12SG, HAX12SH, HAX12SI, HAX12SJ, HAX12SK, HAX12SL, HAX12SM, HAX12SN, HAX12SP, HAX12SQ, HAX12SR, HAX12SS, HAX12ST, HAX12SU, HAX12SV: For how long have you been taking this medicine? (days)

This variable was created from the two-part (number and unit) question X12 using the conversion factors 7 days/week, 30 days/month and 365 days/year. Duration could not always be directly transferred for medicines originally reported as supplements and moved in the data editing process. This was because the duration response categories for

supplement use (X8) did not match the corresponding response categories for prescription medicines (X12). A response of "less than one month" in X8 was changed to blank but applicable (8-fills) in X12 for medicines that were originally recorded as supplements.

HAX13AG, HAX13AH, HAX13AI, HAX13AJ: Antacid identification code

This variable was created to identify over-the-counter antacids. The coding scheme enabled responses to be classified at various levels of specificity, depending on the information provided by the respondent. The codes are for specific products, as well for incomplete trade names or more general responses. As necessary, data from the unit of measure question (X16) were used to aid in coding antacid responses. For example, Pepto Bismol is available in two liquid forms of the product (350 or 351), and in the tablet form (352). If the unit of measure specified tablets or pills then the product was coded as Pepto Bismol Tablets (352). Responses that were likely to be antacids but could not be further identified, and generic antacid products were all coded as "other antacids" (459).

HAX15SG, HAX15SH, HAX15SI, HAX15SJ: How often did you take this antacid in the past month?

This variable was created for each reported antacid from the two-part (number and unit) question X15, using the conversion factors used 30 days/month and 4 weeks/month.

HAX16AG, HAX16AH, HAX16AI, HAX16AJ: How much did you take of this antacid each time? (quantity)

This variable is the first part of a two-part question (X16) on the dosage for each reported antacid. It lists the amount taken. Amounts that were reported in ways that could not be measured, such as "as necessary" or "PRN", were 8-filled.

HAX16A1G, HAX16A1H, HAX16A1I, HAX16A1J: How much did you take of this antacid each time? (unit)

This variable is the second part of a two-part question (X16) on the dosage of the antacid taken. It lists the unit for the quantity reported for each antacid reported.

HAX17SG, HAX17SH, HAX17SI, HAX17SJ: How long have you been taking this antacid? (months)

This variable was created from the two-part (number and unit) question X17 using the conversion factors used were 30 days/month, 4 weeks/month, and 12 months/year. Responses of 5 and 6 weeks, or 10 weeks were rounded to one and two months, respectively.

HAX18D, HAX18E, HAX18F, HAX18G: Have you taken any other pain relief medicines in the past month?

Respondents were asked about other non-prescription pain relief medicines reported, other than aspirin, acetaminophen, and ibuprofen.

HAX18DB, HAX18EB, HAX18FB, HAX18GB: Product type code for other pain relief medicines

A product type code was created to classify pain relievers that were not aspirin, acetaminophen, and ibuprofen. Combinations of aspirin and acetaminophen (e.g. "Excedrin Extra Strength Tablets") were categorized as "Other ingested pain medications" (1). However, combinations of aspirin and caffeine (e.g. "Anacin"), and aspirin with a buffering agent (e.g. "Bufferin") were considered aspirin and moved to X18a. Pain relievers that were known to be available only by prescription (e.g. "Darvon") were moved to the prescription medication section (X9-X12). When reported in this section, "Alka Seltzer" was treated as a non-prescription pain relief medication since it was assumed that if it was reported here it was being used for pain relief.

HAX19AS: How often did you take aspirin in the past month?

This variable was created from the two-part (number and unit) question X19a using the conversion factors 30 days/month and 4 weeks/months.

HAX19BS: How often did you take acetaminophen in the past month?

This variable was created from the two-part (number and unit) question X19b using the conversion factors 30 days/month and 4 weeks/months.

HAX19CS: How often did you take ibuprofen in the past month?

This variable was created from the two-part (number and unit) question X19c using the conversion factors 30 days/month and 4 weeks/months.

HAX19DS, HAX19ES, HAX19FS, HAX19GS: How often did you take other pain relief medicine in the past month?

This variable was created from the two-part (number and unit) question X19 using the conversion factors 30 days/week and 4 weeks/month.

HAY10: Quality of interview

This variable is the interviewer's assessment of the reliability of interview. Interviewers determined if one or more section was possibly unreliable according to a number of factors including respondent identity (i.e. proxy v. sample person), mental competency of the respondent (or proxy), etc. Because there was no record of the sections that were possibly unreliable, all interviews were retained.

HAY11A-HAY11J: Observed characteristics of the sample person

Interviewers were asked to complete this question only if they observed the

sample person or if the household proxy respondent they spoke with voluntarily told them about some specific characteristic of the sample person. They were told to use their best judgement. If the interviewer couldn't tell for sure, they marked "DK". For example, if they only observed a person in bed, they wouldn't know if the person used a cane, crutches, walker, or wheelchair ordinarily. If the sample person mentioned this information, the interviewer recorded the fact. In item i, "dressed in street clothes?", the interviewers differentiated between clothes worn to go to work, school, or to conduct errands or extracurricular activities versus those typically worn only in the home such as pajamas. In item k, "other physical characteristics", the interviewers were asked to only mention characteristics that were health-related, such as "limps", "has cold", "disoriented/cognitively impaired", etc.

HAZA5R: Radial pulse rate (beats per minute)

This variable is a 60-second pulse rate derived by multiplying the radial pulse count at 30 seconds by two.

HAZA7A, HAZA7B: Maximum inflation level (MIL) and second MIL

The MIL was obtained to determine the highest level to which the blood pressure cuff should be inflated. It should be 30 mm Hg higher than the point at which the radial pulse disappeared.

HAZA8AK5: K5 blood pressure measurement

Zero was considered a valid observation for diastolic (K5) measurements when pulse sounds continue to be heard down to 0 mm Hg.

HAZA8BK5: Second K5 blood pressure measurement

See note for HAZA8AK5.

HAZA8CK5: Third K5 blood pressure measurement

See note for HAZA8AK5.

HAZA8DK1: K1 fourth blood pressure measurements

A fourth systolic blood pressure measurement was taken only when the household interviewer failed to hear one of the previous three systolic measurements. A maximum of three valid, systolic measurements were included in the data file.

HAZA8DK5: K5 fourth blood pressure measurement

See note for HAZA8AK5. A fourth diastolic blood pressure measurement was taken only when the household interviewer failed to hear one of the previous three diastolic measurements. A maximum of three valid, diastolic measurements were included in the file.

HAZMNK1R: Mean K1 systolic blood pressure

This variable is the arithmetic mean of six or fewer K1 measurements obtained at the household interview (maximum of three) and the MEC examination (maximum of three). If the examinee did not have blood pressure measurements taken during the household interview, this variable should include blood pressure measurements taken at the MEC, if the examinee had a MEC examination. Since this variable is an arithmetic mean, it may include odd numbers. For additional information on blood pressure measurements, see NHANES III Examination Data File.

HAZMNK5R: Mean K5 diastolic blood pressure

This variable is the arithmetic mean of six or fewer K5 measurements obtained at the household interview (maximum of three) and the MEC examination (maximum of three). If the examinee did not have blood pressure measurements taken during the household interview, this variable includes blood pressure measurements taken at the MEC if the examinee had a MEC exam. Since this variable is an arithmetic mean, it may include odd numbers. The arithmetic mean was calculated using only K5 measurements greater than zero. Any K5 measurements of zero were set to missing when calculating the K5 arithmetic mean. For additional information on blood pressure measurements, see NHANES III Examination Data File.
